
Road Construction in Chester County Underway on Route 100 Other Area Roads to be Affected over Next 12 Months



Construction is underway on a \$7.5 million project to resurface a dozen state roads in Chester County. First up, crews will work from now through July 15 to mill and pave Route 100 between Route 30 and Business Route 30 in West Whiteland Township. Work will take place from 7 p.m. to 5 a.m. Motorists are advised to allow extra time when traveling on Route 100 during this overnight operation.

Some additional state roads to be resurfaced in the future under this project, all of which are expected to be completed by June 2012, include:

- King of Prussia Road between Upper Gulph Road and Croton Road in Tredyffrin Township;
 - Old Eagle School Road between Upper Gulph Road and Devon Park Drive in Tredyffrin Township;
 - Croton Road between Old Eagle School Road and Upper Gulph Road in Tredyffrin Township;
 - Swedesford Road between Route 29 (Morehall Road) and the Cedar Hollow Road in East Whiteland Township;
 - Darby Road/Sugartown Road between Route 30 (Lancaster Avenue) and Valley Forge Road/Devon Road in Easttown Township;
 - Sugartown Road between Zine Lane/King Street and Goshen Road in Willistown Township;
 - Church Road between Sugartown Road and the Delaware County line in Easttown Township;
 - Phoenixville Pike/Whitehorse Road between Spring Mill Drive and Route 23 (Valley Forge Road) in Charlestown and Schuylkill townships;
 - King Road between Phoenixville Pike and Hershey Mill Road in East Whiteland and West Whiteland townships;
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- Conestoga Road between Cassatt Avenue and Devon State Road in Tredyffrin Township; Route 29 (Morehall Road) between Route 30 (Lancaster Pike) and Matthews Road in East Whiteland Township; and
- Route 30 (Lancaster Avenue) at Route 252 (Bear Hill Road) in Tredyffrin Township.

No timetables for these projects have yet been released, but I will inform you as they become available.
